

#### THEORY OF CHANGE

RCBC has always stood upon the foundational facts of the pollution prevention hierarchy in all of its work. It is a simple and now well understood and accepted fact that the creation, management and disposal of 'waste' is damaging to human health and the planet. And, as we are seeing with climate change impacts, our finite system can no longer bear the consequences of continued growth.

At the time that RCBC was born, recycling WAS a leading-edge, innovative and practical solution, but 4 decades later we recognize that we need to evolve to remain relevant, and that further bold innovation is required to truly address the issue of waste generation and disposal.

We recognize that it isn't just behavior change but systems change that needs to be activated

Over the next five years, the Recycling Council of British Columbia is committed to working to create a circular economy in B.C.

We'll do this by informing and educating the public, businesses and institutions through raising awareness of the circular economy and sharing strategies for moving our collective actions up the waste hierarchy.

We'll influence systems and frameworks in support of more robust norms, guidelines, resources, and legislation for a circular economy and waste reduction.

And, to serve this work, we will convene our colleagues, partners, allies and sector experts to discuss innovation, deepen our understanding and build capacity.

This theory of change was developed as the result of a 2022 Impact and Strategic Clarity process, intended to evaluate and understand RCBC's strategic direction and goals. This Theory of Change is the framework for RCBC's work to create a Circular Economy in BC.
